Yorkshire Preachers: no.3

John Shaw (1814-1879: New Connexion) Born at Pudsey, John Shaw began his working life at the age of eight, transporting coal from Pudsey to Tong on two donkeys. The only education he received was at Sunday School. A member of the Methodist New Connexion from 1829, John faced an oral examination in 1839 before becoming a local preacher. Several doctrinal and theological questions he answered by saying, "I don't know". When asked "Then what do you know?", he replied, "Well, Jesus saved me when I first believed; He's saved me ever since and He saves me now, and if there's anything in Him for me that I haven't got, He'll be sure to give it to me." Heard at last year's carol service, when Tim announced we should come into the presence of the Lord -


