## Charity Coffee Pots



Coffee Pot is open every Wednesday (10.30am -12.0 noon). Please join us for tea/coffee, cakes and chat - and bring your friends!

The Charity Coffee Pot held on 6<sup>th</sup> July raised £205 for Peertalk. Thank you to all those who supported this.

Our next Charity Coffee Pot, to be held on Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> August, will be in aid of The Smile Train. Smile Train is an international children's charity with a sustainable approach to a single, solvable issue: a cleft lip and palate. More than 200,000 new babies are born with clefts every year globally, causing the child to have difficulty with breathing and feeding. £150 can cover the cost of cleft surgery, which takes approximately 45 minutes and can change the child's life forever, but many families don't have the money to pay. Smile Train provides a full range of cleft treatment services which a child may not otherwise receive.

August Eco Tips: Small changes to make your home more eco friendly

- Wash clothes on a lower temperature: up to 90% of the energy used by a washing machine goes towards heating water.
- Skip the dryer when possible..... if you are able, peg your washing out outside. During dry and sunny months, it's a shame not to dry your laundry outside either on a line or airer.
- Swap regular light bulbs for LED bulbs: Investing in the right energy efficient light bulbs makes a huge difference. You will not only use less electricity, but you will make your home environmentally friendly
- Decorate your house with plants: Potted plants are effective for indoor air cleaning.

I began mentally listing every Shakespeare quote I knew about time (Macbeth is full of them!) finally reaching: "Time travels in divers paces with divers persons. Looking round I realised that for the staff it was another hectic shift. For some waiting it was probably the longest night of their lives, worrying about loved ones, wondering if this was the night that would change their lives forever. For patients admitted by ambulance, time might be racing away from them as they feared these might be their last hours. Some were longing for time to stand still,*

*to allow them to hold back the minutes as they slipped inexorably away. Others were desperate for the long wait to be over, and others were simply trying to get through another shift. Yet for everyone time actual passed at the same speed. How difficult it is to look out over infinity and know that no matter what the situation, this too will pass – and yet how comforting also to know that it truly will.*
